

Delivering what you want

Funding Waverley's Future — tell us what you think!

Last year Council went to the community to find out how important our services are to residents and ratepayers. The overwhelming response was those services are valued. Now Council is taking the next step to work out how to deliver these services over the next 12 years.

Waverley Council now provides 148 services – from cleaning and greening parks and beaches and providing childcare to running popular facilities such as the Bondi Pavilion.

Over the past decade our services and outputs have doubled. At the same time cost-shifting to local government means councils now pay for things like mandatory contributions to the NSW Fire Service. Councils have also been given additional responsibilities in areas such as companion animal regulation.

Meanwhile, over 30 years of rate pegging has resulted in a steady decrease in councils' rates revenue. For Waverley Council, rates now fund less than 28% of the total cost of our services with the remainder coming from less reliable sources such as user fees and charges.

There is no other council in Sydney where the percentage of total income from rates is as low as it is in Waverley.

We are proud to provide such an impressive range of services to help strengthen, build and nurture the community. However, over the next 12 years the cost of providing existing services alone is projected to rise by 50%, yet our overall income is set to rise by only 31%.

In 2009, we facilitated extensive community consultation to develop a 12-year strategic plan, Waverley Together 2. As part of our consultation we asked what services the community wanted Council to provide and to what levels.

Consultation closes

Sunday 31 October 2010

Throughout the process of developing this plan, the community signalled they appreciate Council's services, did not want any cut, and in some cases wanted them expanded.

Now we need the community's input again. Council has calculated that over the next 12 years we need an extra \$125 million to fund existing services, and an additional \$99 million to fund enhanced services to the levels requested by the community during last year's consultation.

Council has put together a range of funding options - including a special rate variation - and we'd like to hear what you think is the fairest and most responsible way forward.

MAYOR'S MESSAGE



Over the past few weeks you would've received information as part of our communication strategy to ensure residents have all the facts they need to help Council make one of its biggest decisions in many years. Together, we need to work out how to fund our broad range of services and to what level.

Whatever decision we make will affect our community because we will either decide to cut back services, maintain them or expand them – so it's critical your voice is heard.

Council's long term financial strategy is fairly complex. This issue of Waverley in Focus has lots of information on the challenge we are facing and how you can provide your input.

We want our residents and ratepayers to fully understand the history of how we arrived at this point, the options we can consider and the impacts of each decision.

In the late 1990s our income increased substantially due to the installation of parking meters and the number of services provided by Council increased accordingly. In fact, almost a third of our existing services such as environmental planning and education, civic pride, place management and graffiti removal did not exist 12 years ago.

Waverley's rates are comparatively low to other Sydney areas and our rates fund less than a third of our current budget, unlike many other councils who can rely upon rates for 40-45% of their income.

Our calculations indicate that we will have a funding shortfall if we are to continue to deliver many of our existing services over the next 12 years and increase some services as requested by residents as part of the Waverley Together 2 consultation process. So we are hoping to find a responsible way to increase our stable revenue.

Please take the time to read the next few pages of this newsletter to find out more. We welcome your input into helping us make these critical decisions.

GENERAL MANAGER'S COLUMN

I'm pleased to have been part of the launch of our Customer Service Charter in August. The Charter sets out what each customer can expect when they contact us and expresses our commitment to good quality customer service. It includes important standards for responding to your enquiries. I believe Council's primary role is customer service and the Charter underlines this.

While I'm on the topic of services, I'd like to highlight some you may not be aware of. An interesting one is the Waverley Community Living Program, which helps residents with a mild intellectual disability gain the skills to lead independent lives. With the support of parents, case workers and the Department of Community Services, this has been a very successful program.

Our Affordable and Social Housing Program is quite innovative. This program, primarily through contributions acquired from development within the local government area, has provided subsidised accommodation for many eligible residents.

We operate three childcare centres and will soon start construction of a 52 place Early Learning Childcare Centre in Bondi Junction. We also coordinate the Waverley Family Day Care Service which has 40 carers servicing more than 200 families from Waverley to Pyrmont.

A diverse range of educational and cultural programs operate at Bondi Pavilion, the Bondi Road Art School and the Waverley Library. Residents can learn to paint, see theatre, play music or simply enjoy the gallery.

I'm proud of the range of services that we strive to provide and how much they are appreciated. This issue of *Waverley in Focus* has a lot of important information about our services and their future funding. Please take a look at the details. We welcome your views.

What does Council do for you?

Local government is now responsible for many more services than in the past.

Waverley Council currently provides 148 services. At least 40 of them did not exist 12 years ago and a further 76 have been significantly expanded.

Waverley Together 2

In 2009, Council worked with the community to develop our 12 year strategic plan, *Waverley Together 2*.

It sets out the community's vision of what life should be like in Waverley by 2022.

The plan identifies the community's main priorities and future aspirations by outlining strategies and key partners for achieving these goals.

We undertook extensive consultation to develop this plan. For about six weeks, we hosted a moderated web forum which attracted 170 comments, a series of study groups with 34

residents over a two month period, and held a 'Have a Say Day' which attracted 300 interested residents.

We also commissioned a statistically valid survey with 500 residents to assess their views on the importance of and their satisfaction with Council services. They made it very clear that they appreciated Council services and in some cases wanted them expanded.

This consultation feedback led to the development of the *Service Plus* package. For more information on the *Service Plus* package please see the article below.

10 benefits of Service Plus

Service Plus has many benefits, here's 10 of the best...

- 1 We can keep at least 75% of your roads, kerbs, stairs, fences and infrastructure in parks and cemeteries in top or near top condition at any one time.
- We can upgrade more of your footpaths so that at least 80% are in top condition at any one time.
- We can keep your streets cleaner and greener with less graffiti and dumped rubbish and more trees and gardens.
- We can work closely with residents to assist them with practical advice about the best and cheapest ways to switch to renewable energy and even achieve reductions in energy bills.
- 5 We can work closely with other big business owners in Bondi Junction to switch big buildings and street lighting onto more sustainable forms of energy generation. This would help us cut the current greenhouse gas emissions of the local area by up to 10% while we lower energy costs for everyone.
- 6 We can expand your sporting facilities and the quality of your cricket, football, soccer, netball and bocce playing fields to catch up with the backlog of demand for this type of facility.
- 7 We can deliver upgrades of facilities in parks, like playgrounds, shade structures, picnic shelters, showers, toilets and exercise facilities.
- 8 We can manage big events and festivals with extra rangers and clean-up services to keep your neighbourhood a little quieter and cleaner at these times.
- 9 We can provide seniors with extra access to support services provided by Council and other government agencies and we will increase services to assist the homeless and most disadvantaged in our area.
- 10 We can give you much better information on future projects so you can choose which decisions you want to influence and how to become involved.

Service Plus...

doing even more for our community

Service Plus is a package that includes our existing services, plus more than 50 enhancements, as requested through the Waverley Together 2 consultation.

The enhancements include:

- providing more opportunities for recreation, health, wellbeing, artistic and cultural expression including upgrades to Bondi Pavilion, extra community gardens, parks improvements at Bronte, Bondi and Tamarama and sports fields upgrades at Waverley Park, Rodney Reserve and Hugh Bamford Reserve.
- providing more and safer access to public places, to transport and vital services, including improving footpath conditions, providing safer school zones and crossings, renewal of vital infrastructure such as drains and retaining walls and an increased focus on older residents ensuring they have access to healthy lifestyle programs.
- providing more cleaning and greening of all public spaces, more healthy well maintained trees in our streets and parks, carefully designed and cared for roundabouts, parks and playgrounds, and faster graffiti and bill poster removal.

- providing more inviting streetscapes and restful neighbourhoods so our villages will be attractive and inviting places to meet, socialise and simply enjoy. Charing Cross and Bronte Beach villages along with Oxford Street East in Bondi Junction to be upgraded.
- providing a more sustainable environment to help address global warming and preservation of natural resources and ecosystems. This would include improvements in energy and water consumption in Council facilities, commercial premises and homes. We will also expand Bushcare programs and complete other natural habitat restoration works.
- partnering with a more engaged and connected community actively involved in decision making. In particular, enriching our web functionality, using social media opportunities and expanding Council's services online.

Due to careful and innovative financial planning, reasonably reliable funding sources have been identified for 91% of the existing services and 54% of the requested enhancements.

For Council to deliver all of *Service Plus*, an extra \$224 million is needed over the next decade.

Funding the future

Waverley's rates

The average Waverley ratepayer pays \$716, excluding the Environmental Levy, while half of our ratepayers pay the 'minimum rate' of \$387.

Approximately 65% of Waverley's ratepayers are paying almost 20% less than other Sydney ratepayers. This is despite land values across Sydney often being significantly lower than Waverley properties.

In fact, Waverley's average residential rate is approximately \$150 a year lower than the average paid by residents in the rest of Sydney, Wollongong and Central Coast.

Randwick and Woollahra residents generally pay up to 35% higher in their average rates.



Over the years Council has worked to find alternative income and cost savings to keep our average rates one of the lowest in NSW.

However, rates now fund less than 28% of existing services and it's estimated that by 2022 that will drop to just 25%. This is not a sustainable model.

Council is considering a range of funding options to create a larger stable income.

A special rate variation is one option. If this option is pursued, and approved by the State Government, Council would ideally look at increasing rates by a small percentage gradually over seven years from July 2011.

Future options

Council is considering a range of options on how to fund its current services and requested enhancements over the next decade.







SPECIAL RATE VARIATION

- Council could apply to the State Government to increase rates above the annual rate cap enough to maintain existing services.
 - The increase would need to be high enough to raise the expected \$125 million needed for the next 12 years.
- Alternatively, Council could apply for a rates increase to maintain exisiting services plus all of the requested enhancements.
 - This would mean that the increase would need to be high enough to generate \$224 million over the next 12 years.
- Another option is to increase rates to cover existing services and some but not all of the enhancements.

This would mean that the rate increase would need to cover the \$125 million plus additional funds for the agreed enhancements, meaning a reduced version of the Service Plus package.

RAISE FEES AND CHARGES

Raising revenue from asset sales, fees and charges has already helped fund shortfalls for existing services and just over half of the required expenditure on enhancements.

However, to fund the total shortfall, fees and charges would need to be dramatically increased and Council does not consider this to be the best or most sustainable option.

For example, if we relied upon parking revenue to maintain or enhance our services, fees would need to quadruple and fines would need to annually increase by 140%.

OR WE CAN MAINTAIN THE STATUS QUO...

Council could simply increase rates each year in line with the current rate pegging, but the reality is that this would mean a cut in services over the next decade.

Over the next 12 years the cost of providing existing services will rise by 50%, yet Council's income is projected to rise by only 31%.

If Council does not find the extra \$125 million, there will be services cuts to an average of \$10 million or 10% each year in that period.

Several of Council's existing services such as childcare centres, affordable housing programs, garbage and recycling collections and the cemetery would not be affected as they do not rely upon rates income.

The services most affected would be the ones least able to access alternative sources of income.

They include:

- some community services including services for the aged, youth, families, the disabled, and the homeless
- the majority of our current environmental services
- at least 10% of the annual asset and infrastructure renewal program
- our current place management services and recreational and cultural programs
- street cleaning services, especially in summer peaks
- library services
- health inspections and other regulatory functions
- parks and beach maintenance
- lifeguard services
- our long term community and financial planning.

Your questions answered

What kind of special rate variation is Council considering?

Council is considering the advantages and disadvantages of a special rate variation across a seven year period to provide a gradual but sustainable rise in rate revenue.

In seven years time, to **maintain existing services**:

- 50% of residential ratepayers would pay an extra \$4 each week than they otherwise would have paid
- a further 17% would pay an extra \$7 each week
- an additional 14% would pay \$10 more each week.

In seven years time, to maintain and enhance existing services:

- 50% of residential ratepayers would pay an extra \$8 each week than they otherwise would have paid
- a further 17% would pay \$14 more each week
- an additional 14% would pay an extra \$20 each week.

Is a special rate variation a foregone conclusion?

No, this period of consultation is to determine the community's response to the funding choices, what service level they want and their attitude to a special rate variation. After that feedback is received, Council will make a decision about whether or not to apply for a special rate variation and to what amount.

If we do decide to apply for a rate increase, it will then go to the State Government to make the final decision. The State Government would most likely make its decision in mid 2011.

How would Waverley's rates compare to other councils' rates if a special rate variation goes ahead?

Even if the full package of enhanced services were adopted by Council, in seven years time those on the minimum rate (50%) will still be paying at least 10% less than the expected average rate for Sydney residents at that time.

If we increased rates to maintain existing services, those ratepayers on the minimum rate would pay approximately 30% less than the expected average rate for Sydney residents at that time.

Has Council mismanaged its funds?

No. The expected funding shortfall is not due to financial mismanagement. It's simply because Council's income for the next decade is not expected to grow at the same pace as the expected increases in the cost of providing existing services. The cost of Council's existing services will rise by 50% over the next decade, which is almost double the expected pace of growth in total revenues.

Council has worked hard to find alternative income and cost savings to reduce the burden of service provision for ratepayers and residents.

Council has been able to source funds for 91% of our existing services and just over half the cost of proposed service enhancements and works.

Most councils are able to rely on rates for at least 40–45% of their income. In contrast, Waverley only raises a maximum of 30% of its income from rates.

Council already gets a lot from parking revenue, why can't you rely upon that?

It is true that Council has raised a significant amount of money from parking over the past years.

This source of income has allowed Council to delay the consideration of a rates increase.

What happens next?

Following consultation, Council will need to decide in late 2010 whether it will apply for a special rate variation or to simply increase rates in line with the current rate capping system and cut services to balance the budget.

As part of our future funding consultation we are holding presentations to all precinct meetings in September and October.

Our precinct system is a great way to get involved and have your questions answered first hand.

Waverley's environmental future

WHAT WE WANT TO DO OVER THE NEXT DECADE ...

Council has a range of initiatives planned to reach our targets as outlined in the Environmental Action Plan 2. They are dependent upon Council finding additional income as the Environmental Levy ceases next year. Here are some of the initiatives planned.

Our community and Council

are strongly committed to protecting the local environment and ensuring the area's sustainability.

This commitment is not new.

Our community's commitment is demonstrated by the high uptake of environmental programs and workshops, keen interest in rebates, and the array of residents, schools and businesses implementing measures to reduce waste and energy and water use.

For the past 10 years Waverley ratepayers have helped fund an Environmental Levy, which has gone towards initiatives to protect and improve our local environment.

In June 2011, the 3.4% levy expires and Council can not reapply for another one. For Council to continue its proactive commitment to sustainability, another source of income needs to be found.

During consultation for the community strategic plan, Waverley Together 2, strong concern was indicated for the environment and potential loss of beaches, biodiversity and lifestyle, particularly through the effects of global warming.

This feedback guided us in the development of our *Environmental Action Plan 2* (*EAP2*).

It's clear the community believes sustainability, protecting our environment and reaching our environmental targets are a priority.

The EAP2's targets are ambitious and aim to dramatically reduce greenhouse gas emissions, plan appropriately for future climate change impacts, reduce reliance on quality drinking water, manage waste and enhance our local flora and fauna populations.

Strong planning, rigorous data analysis and cost benefit feasibilities of potential strategies were undertaken to develop this plan.

It is a plan for both Council and the community to protect Waverley's environmental future.

- Invest \$477,000 in energy efficiency improvements for Council buildings and community facilities, saving \$1.65 million and reducing emissions by 13%.
- Invest \$290,000 in energy efficient street lighting, reducing emissions by 11% and saving \$498,000 over 10 years.
- Invest in cogeneration for the Bondi Junction commercial centre giving businesses and residents access to greener and cheaper electricity.
- Invest over \$3 million to help residents and businesses reduce energy and water use and install discounted energy efficient technologies including solar hot water systems, rainwater tanks and solar photovoltaic systems.
- Continue to invest approximately \$500,000 in our education and workshop program over the next 10 years.
- Continue to provide grants to schools and community groups to implement energy and water saving and sustainability initiatives.
- Invest \$2.7 million on improving and expanding the bike network in Waverley and another \$400,000 creating secure bike parking and end of trip facilities for bike users.
- Spend \$1 million regenerating Tamarama Gully and investigating water harvesting opportunities and an additional \$930,000 in Bronte Gully to extend the stormwater harvesting reuse project.
- Invest \$1 million to improve the quality of stormwater entering our beaches by improving pollution control in the upper catchment.
- Spend \$250,000 to improve wildlife habitat corridors on public and private land.

Environmental Levy highlights

The Environmental Levy has helped fund a range of exciting projects, workshops and programs over the past decade.

Some of the levy's biggest achievements include:

- educating over 35,000 residents through our extensive program of free environmental courses and workshops in partnership with the Eastern Suburbs Community College
- providing over \$100,000 funding to Waverley schools to implement kitchen gardens, compost systems, rainwater tanks, and running environmental audits in line with the schools' curriculums
- installing pollution control devices in high risk stormwater catchments
- implementation of the multiaward winning Bronte Stormwater Harvesting and Reuse Project, which saves 15 million litres of potable water annually from toilet flushing and irrigation of the park
- restoring remnant vegetation on the Waverley Coastal Walk

- implementation of the Bondi Road School of the Arts rainwater harvesting and reuse system for toilet flushing and irrigation
- working with 12 of the 16 local schools to undertake an environmental auditing program and develop a School **Environmental Management** Plan in line with Department of Education and Training requirements
- commencement of erosion control works at Bronte Gully
- implementation of the Greenwave Business program helping businesses reduce operational costs through energy and water efficiency
- public place recycling at beaches and parks
- installation of rainwater tanks at our childcare facilities
- installation of solar panel systems on Bondi Pavilion, Bondi Surf Bathers Life Saving Club and Tamarama Surf Life Saving Club.

Bushcare groups hold regular workdays to tend to local areas of natural bush. Come along to a meeting near you and help protect our local bushland.

Revolutionaries in the suburbs



Over 550 Waverley and Randwick households participated in a year long home compost trial, *The Compost Revolution*.

The compost 'revolutionaries' achieved a lot in the past year. They learned how to compost or wormfarm, monitor and report their progress and saved over 80 tonnes of food waste from being trucked around our neighbourhood and out to landfill.

Evaluation of the program showed that when people started composting they often started gardening more, growing their own food and cut down on wasted food.

Modelling done by consultants showed that if expanded, the compost program could provide significant cost savings for Council and reduce our community's greenhouse gas emissions.

Food waste in landfill creates methane, which although it's a potent greenhouse gas, makes rich healthy soil if composted.

They also found that composting has important social and community benefits

Due to the program's success and the potential benefits for our community and Council, the program will return next year.

COMPOST AND WORM FARMING

This intriguing photo, from a series of three similar images, purports to show a Gypsy camp and a resident

having her fortune told in the sand hills near Bondi's Blair Street. Historian BT Dowd, author of The History of the Waverley Municipal District (1859-1959), claims a Gypsy

camp existed at Bondi from the late 1800s to the early 20th century.

BT Dowd said, "Here they did a thriving business, selling various kinds of goods and in telling fortunes. There appeared to be some people from Argentina and Mexico amongst

"The women wore a bright garb with much decoration in gold and silver ornamentation. Though living in tents and wagons they seemed to have plenty of money, goods and jewellery. With the party there were a number of children - very precocious - many asking if they would be allowed to read palms."



"The camp created a good deal of public attention while at Bondi."

But who were Bondi's Gypsies?

Gypsies are stereotypically darkfeatured people, often described as being Romanies, or of Romany descent who traditionally live by seasonal work and fortune telling and are found across the world.

BT Dowd described the Gypsies as being 'Greek', while another early historian, Major W Johnston, described them as 'Spanish'. They could also be early Lebanese hawkers who were commonly found in the streets of Sydney at this time. Or, they could have been real Romany Gypsies – a romantic thought indeed!
